Book recommendations:

- 'Can I tell you about Autism?', by Jude Welton
- 'My Autism Book', by Gloria Dura-Vila and Tamar Levi
- 'The Secret Life of Rose'. Rose, and Mum Jodie write about autistic experiences from a young person's perspective which are then explained by an Autism Practitioner. They discuss stimming, masking, sensory differences and issues around school, and friendships. 'The Secret Life of Rose: Inside an Autistic Head': Amazon.co.uk
- Alis Rowe has written a whole series of book which are very visual guides. She has these
 under the title of 'The Girl with the Curly Hair.'

These books inform you about autism, whereas the books below are either fiction, based around fact, or written from the inside perspective of an autistic individual.

• 'Can you see me?' 'Do you know me?' and 'Ways to be me'. These are about an 11-year-old girl called Tally, her transition into year 7, and being diagnosed as autistic. The books explain what is hard for Tally, because she is different e.g., she is a picky eater, and finds things like noise, and change overwhelming. The book clearly explains how being autistic can impact every aspect of a person's life, yet it also shows that autism can be a superpower, and that some people on the spectrum have better memory or hearing. https://www.amazon.co.uk/Can-You-See-Libby-Scott/dp/1407195670. These books are aimed at 10-14-year-old readers but are very beneficial for autistic adults and support network too.
